

TIPS FOR CREATING AN ARTS EDUCATION DIRECTORY PROFILE FOR AN INDIVIDUAL ARTIST

CREATING YOUR PROFILE

SECTION 1: A summary of the educational experience. (1 sentence)

This should be a subheading that summarizes the educational experience and grabs the reader's attention. The first sentence is the text that will be displayed on the search page. The goal is to entice the reader to click on your profile to read more.

Examples:

- *Explore connections between the arts, learning, and identity using music, poetry and visual arts.*
- *Contemporary dance performance with demonstration and audience participation.*
- *We dance, uplift, challenge and inspire students to deal with themes of struggle, compassion and hope!*
- *Learn about people around the world through their songs and musical instruments.*
- *I teach about Aztec culture through dance and music.*

SECTION 2: Brief description of the teaching artist. (4 sentences)

How would you describe what you do as a professional teaching artist to a complete stranger? (1 sentence)

I am a professional actor who creates lessons using reader's theatre, a form of theatre using scripts, simple gestures, sound effects and vocal expression to tell stories or share information.

What can you say to demonstrate professionalism and artistic excellence? (1 sentence)

As an award-winning poet, I provide a regular workshop series at the Sacramento Public Library and have been invited to perform at the Sacramento Poetry Fest and California Celebration of Literacy.

What is unique about you and your offerings? Is it your teaching method, the art form itself, the tie-ins with other subject areas, etc.? (2 sentences)

In addition to providing students with hands-on activities to strengthen their performance skills, I also videotape performances and lead students through self-evaluation exercises to help them identify their own strengths and future learning objectives. I am one of only a handful of artists working in Sacramento who specializes in circus arts, and the only teaching artist who brings 25 years of performance experience to the classroom.

SECTION 3: Brief description of your arts offerings (2-5 sentences)

Provide a brief description of each offering, focusing on what the students will experience and the value it adds for the student and teacher.

This hands-on workshop allows the students to create music as a group and feel successful in a short period of time. It is a great option for schools that don't have instruments or a music program as it introduces students to the basic elements of music quickly in an engaging manner.

Avoid jargon or references to institutions, organizations, awards, etc. unfamiliar to non-artists.

Instead of this: *I was awarded the Artist Extraordinaire Award from the Prestigious Arts Education Association of America*

Try this: *I will lead your students through engaging lessons quality tested at over 25 sites that use the elements of dance to teach science concepts.*

List a general description about your educational offerings here. You can go into greater depth in your Samples.

Instead of this: *I am available Mondays and Wednesdays, after 10:30 AM, and most Fridays.*
Try this: *I am available during school hours; contact me to discuss your specific scheduling needs.*

SELECTING & ORGANIZING YOUR SAMPLES

Choosing the profile image (Avatar)

- Your Avatar is the first image that will appear whenever your profile is browsed
- If you had to choose one image to tell the story of what you do, what would it be?
- Choose an action photo rather than a logo.
- Remember your audience. What image do you think they would want to see?
- Keep in mind the size of the image and the available space for it on your listing.

Developing Samples and Descriptions

As a registered user of the Directory, you will be able to maintain a Media Gallery of up to 16 files that can be attached to your profile as Samples. These Samples give you the opportunity to more fully describe who you are and what you provide. Each Sample is comprised of 3 parts: The file itself (in JPG, MP3, or PDF format), its caption, and a description. On your profile, each file is displayed as a thumbnail with the caption directly beneath it. Viewers can then click on the caption or thumbnail to view the file at full size, along with both the caption and the description.

Below is a list of recommended Samples, and we advise that you use all that are applicable to you and your educational offerings. We strongly recommend you use at least the 3 suggestions in bold type. When using a suggestion from the list, please use the exact wording below as your caption. This will provide the user with a more consistent overall experience with the directory. Use only the ones that further the visitor's knowledge of you in a useful way.

- 1. Avatar – profile image described above**
2. Resume
3. My Work Samples – your professional work
4. Student Work Samples
- 5. Sample Activities – arts education activities you want to offer**
6. Programs for Schools
7. Programs for Community Sites
8. References and Reviews – where you have recently presented and how they felt about you
9. Ongoing Classes, Workshops & Camps
- 10. Fees and Logistical Requirements**



To maximize your Media Gallery, consider combining several images into a single PDF document. For example, rather than having six separate files of student work samples, combine them all into a single document titled, "Student Work Samples."

Your Sample captions and descriptions are vehicles to understanding the arts experiences you can provide. You will need to develop descriptions for each Sample you want to use. For Samples other than those listed above, you will also need to create a caption that draws the visitor into the subject matter contained within the Sample.

GENERAL TIPS

- **When building narratives, start with bulleted phrases to work out your ideas.** Then, choose those bullet points most vital to your story and turn them into concise sentences.
- **Consider your audience when creating your profile and selecting your images.** The users of the Directory will primarily be school teachers, principals, parent volunteers, and staff at community organizations. Don't just cut and paste existing marketing messages into the profile if they are not a good fit for an audience searching for information about arts education programming.
- **Your profile should tell the story of what you do in a way that is relevant to the audience.** When considering what to include, think about how it adds to the story. If it doesn't, don't include it.

Instead of this description: *This is an example of past student work. It is made of construction paper, glue, and scraps of fabric. This is one of my most popular projects!*

Try this: *This student work was created during this very popular Visual and Performing Arts Standards-based lesson using textiles to create a collage of the human body. Students were asked to choose fabrics with characteristics (color, actual texture, perceived texture, shape, etc.) that represented each system of the body (respiratory, circulatory, digestive, etc.). As a class, we looked at the completed works to compare and contrast the choices each student made, and how their choices illustrated the ways in which the body's various systems work together.*

Instead of this caption: *Oil Painting: Jimmy Eating an Apple, 2010*

Try this: *I use my own artwork to talk about the elements of art (form, color, shape, texture, value, space, line).*

- **Be succinct.** Users may be quickly browsing through listings in the directory. The more succinct your listing is, the more likely they will read it.
- **Check your spelling.**
- **Remember to visit your profile periodically to update the program information.**
